




Are you leaving?

Today marks the 140th anniversary of the invasion of Parihaka.

In what was described in the Crown's 2017 apology as "being among the most shameful [events] in the history of this country", we remember the illegal invasion and sacking of this Māori pacifist community by 1,600 Crown troops, and the imprisonment without trial of its leaders.

MĀIA- COURAGE

"Be on your guard, stand firm in the faith, be people of courage, stand strong" (1 Chronu6:13)

SHARING

This term, all children are focusing on the Communion of Saints. What a perfect why to look at how these people show us the courage to share our faith and gifts with others. Suzanne Aubert and Saint Mary MacKillop of the Cross are two women who are good examples of the Gospel value of courage. When they were only young teenagers, they left their families to go to the unknown. They met new people and communities and were driven by their faith. Suzanne Aubert had to learn a new language and understand a completely new culture. She went against her superiors and stuck to her calling to educate Māori girls. Mary MacKillop went to the rural areas of Australia and ended up seeing a need to provide good education to the poorer families. This decision then led to the development of the Josephite Schools throughout Australia and New Zealand. Both of these women shared their gifts and talents, educating, healing, loving and inspiring others. So much so, that our Catholic primary schools flourish; the Home of Compassion in Wellington feeds, clothes and assists hundreds per day. All because 2 teenage girls had the courage to share their faith, love of God and passions with the world.

COMMUNION OF SAINTS

Each class will be learning about the Communion of Saints. This is a belief in the Church that all of its members are joined in one great unity (in Christ) of belief and worship of God. This includes those now living and those who have died. The word saint means to be holy. All of God's people are called to be saints. Being in communion means to be connected—like a community. Our Church theology is not just about the ME but the WE, so we pray together and for each other.

There are special saints that the Catholic Church have canonised (formally acknowledged for their saintliness/holiness). You may have heard of saints like Saint Mary, Saint Joseph, Saint Christopher & Saint Francis of Assisi. They have been canonised for particular reasons, like Saint Francis of Assisi is the patron saint of animals, as he is a role model for having a deep care for animals and the environment. Saints remind us that God chooses ordinary people that can go on to do extraordinary things!

- What makes Saints such great role models?


You can help your child by:



Policies and procedures are the guide map for how we operate at St Mary's School. This is your opportunity to **help shape the way we operate**. We would love your feedback and suggestions. Every term a number of policies come up for review on a 3 year cycle. Some policies are reviewed by the Board of Trustees, The staff or caregivers, sometimes all three.

Religious Education

Religious education is a specific part of the curriculum, sensitive to all cultures, and integrated into the total life of the school. Regular prayer has a vital place in the classroom, assemblies, and staff life.

Active participation in mass and liturgies is a regular feature of our school's religious education.

Our parish-based sacramental programme involves parents, school, and parish in a meaningful way.

At St Mary's School we fulfil the teaching mission of the Church by living and teaching the values of Jesus Christ.

Leadership

The principal and the director of religious studies provide leadership and sound management in religious education.

· Regular meetings are held to focus on religious education.

Religious education curriculum

The religious education programme is soundly managed and professionally delivered.

- The National Curriculum is implemented.
- . Teaching is effective, creative, and meets the needs of individual students.

Integrated curriculum

The teaching of religious education is integrated with other curriculum areas, especially those which include ethical issues, personal relationships, and sexuality education.

- The national curriculum is implemented and religious education is a compulsory subject at each level.
- The health programme reflects the Catholic special character of the school.
- · Sexuality education is set in the context of the Church's teaching.

Resources

The board makes financial provision for religious education and Catholic special character resources.

- The school makes appropriate use of Catholic Education advisory services and the religious education programme is well
 resourced.
- Staffing time is allocated, and resources given, to religious education as recommended by the New Zealand Catholic Bishops Conference (NZCBC).

Professional development

The school provides opportunities for regular religious education professional development and spiritual development for all staff.

- The school expects all teachers of religious education to be working towards a suitably approved qualification in line with the New Zealand Catholic Bishops Conference requirement for certification.
- · In-school professional development is available at least once per term.
- Catholic Education Office courses are attended by all staff.
- Teachers are encouraged to complete the New Zealand Diploma in Christian Studies (Level 6) Religious Education.
- · Induction and support is provided to new staff.

Communication

The school communicates with parents about religious education programmes.

- · This is done on a regular basis through school newsletters.
- Parents/caregivers are expected to provide input at parent meetings or if the need arises.
- Religious education may be reported as part of each student's assessment and reporting.

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Māori Educational Success

This policy relates to students who identify as Māori students.

St Mary's School is guided in our thinking, planning, and actions for Māori learners by the cross-agency strategy for the education sector, **Ka Hikitia Ka Hāpaitia: The Māori Education Strategy Q**: We support its vision to help Māori learners to enjoy and achieve educational success as Māori, as they develop the skills to participate in te ao Māori, Aotearoa, and the wider world. In keeping with the National Administration Guideline (NAG) 1, the board and staff also consult with the school's Māori community when developing policies, plans, and targets for improving the progress and achievement of Māori students.

St Mary's School is committed to the principles of te Tiriti o Waitangi.

To achieve equitable outcomes for Māori learners, St Mary's School:

- provides Māori learners and their whānau with appropriate information to make informed choices about their education
- recognises and builds on the unique abilities and strengths of Māori learners
- · works to eliminate racism, discrimination, and stigma
- develops productive partnerships with whānau and, where possible, local iwi and hapū
- integrates te reo Māori, tikanga Māori, matauranga Māori, and te ao Māori into school life and the curriculum, as appropriate, to reflect the dual cultural heritage of New Zealand, grow the Māori language, and give Māori students a sense of belonging
- engages with any national, regional, and local implementation plans developed by the Ministry of Education and education agencies
- · supports students with clear transition processes as they move through their schooling
- supports staff to access appropriate professional development and implement effective practices that promote success for Māori students.

St Mary's School monitors and reports on Māori student achievement by:

- tracking the attendance and achievement of all Māori students using our student management system (SMS)
- identifying any areas where a Māori student's educational achievement is not in line with their peers
- providing appropriate learning support and other support programmes for Māori students, as needed
- · evaluating the impact of school programmes and practices and using this information in our self-review
- reporting regularly on the progress of Māori students to parents and the school community, the board, and the Ministry of Education.



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CHURCH'S TEACHING ON EUTHANASIA

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

On Sunday 7 Nov we mark a very sad day in our Nation's history as euthanasia tragically becomes legally possible. At this time we need to remind ourselves that all life is sacred, from natural conception to natural death. This is the clear teaching of the Catholic Church; hence, abortion and euthanasia are not options for us who want to avoid serious sin, because we love God, and want to stay faithful to Christ and his Church, hoping to enjoy eternal salvation with him in paradise.

Let us pray earnestly for those most vulnerable through pregnancy, sickness and terminal illness, that life will always be protected and that no one will seek to take the life of another, born or unborn. Fr Vaughan.

Catechism of the Catholic Church on Euthanasia 2276 Those whose lives are diminished or weakened

deserve special respect. Sick or handicapped persons should be helped to lead lives as normal as possible. 2277 Whatever its motives and means, direct euthanasia consists in putting an end to the lives of handicapped, sick, or dying persons. It is morally unacceptable. Thus an act or omission which, of itself or by intention, causes death in order to eliminate

unacceptable. Thus an act or omission which, or itself or by intention, causes death in order to eliminate suffering constitutes a murder gravely contrary to the dignity of the human person and to the respect due to the living God, his Creator. The error of judgment into which one can fall in good faith does not change the nature of this murderous act, which must always be forbidden and excluded.

2278 Discontinuing medical procedures that are burdensome, dangerous, extraordinary, or disproportionate to the expected outcome can be legitimate; it is the refusal of "over-zealous" treatment. Here one does not will to cause death; one's inability to impede it is merely accepted. The decisions should be made by the patient if he is competent and able or, if not, by those legally entitled to act for the patient, whose reasonable will and legitimate interests must always be respected. 2279 Even if death is thought imminent, the ordinary care owed to a sick person cannot be legitimately interrupted. The use of painkillers to alleviate the sufferings of the dying, even at the risk of shortening their days, can be morally in conformity with human dignity if death is not willed as either an end or a means, but only foreseen and tolerated as inevitable. Palliative care is a special form of disinterested charity,

as such it should be encouraged.



The objective of this phase is to consult the People of God so that the synodal process is carried out through listening to all. This will primarily be done by groups and individuals making submissions to the Diocese in the month of November. This consultation will conclude with a pre-synodal meeting, which will be the culmination of Diocesan discernment


We need your help...


